In math, we introduced subtraction using the number rods. Using this material helps the children visualize this math concept. Once they have grasped the concept, they will be able to understand the math concept without having to rely on the materials. Some students are still practicing the short bead stairs, as it is important to master this activity before advancing to more challenging work. We are encouraging all students to continue memorizing the math facts. A lesson was given

on the flashcards and writing down the facts they get wrong.

For language, students continued practicing penmanship, alphabetizing, letter sounds, and blends! Some students received a lesson on CVC words and "word chunks." Students also completed a fall themed poem and illustrated a fall scene

In the afternoons, students had lessons on North American culture and the parts of the sunflower. They also made a Grandparent's Day gift.

In math the students learned about the quarter, reviewed the penny, nickel, and dime. They also worked on applications, booklets, and geometry cards.

In language the second grade students were introduced to animal group terms. The third grade students reviewed synonyms

and antonyms.

In science they are working on the parts of a tree, flower, and learned about different types of roots.

In art the students created an art project that is related to fall and botany.

This week we had an age appropriate discussion about the events that took place on 9/11. We also sung the national anthem.

In social studies we continue to review the compass rose and direction along with mapping.

In history the students had a lesson on the months of the year.

Students need to

continue to practice their times tables, addition facts, and subtraction facts at home. Once they have mastered them they will no longer have to be tested weekly.

B o o k s went home last Friday; they stay at home and the students are required to read 30 minutes every night. The book will be brought back to school when the student has finished reading and completed their book report, which is due on 9/27/24. They also prepared a card and a composition about how they love and honor their grandparents. Hopefully, everyone had an enjoyable day.

This Tuesday was the fourth graders' first history test on the geography of Florida. Most students did very well. We would like to congratulate Hely, James, Aryeh, Jax, and Alexander for earning the highest grades on the test. The next section will cover the different regions in Florida.

This week fifth graders completed their first book report in class on Friday, the next book report will be due on Monday, September 30th. In language, fifth grade students are working on the language towers and were reintroduced to subjects and predicates. In math, they are being encouraged to keep their math sets organized and we are emphasizing the importance of neatness. Students are doing well reviewing previous concepts that they learned last year. In Geography, they are continuing to work on their mapping skills booklet, exploring different regions of North America. In Botany, students learned the characteristics and classifications of the plant kingdom.

Sixth graders had their second science test last Friday. Everyone did very well! We would like to congratulate Bianca and Janie for earning a hundred percent. The next science test will be on September 18th. To help our students to prepare accordingly, we have asked them to write the Key Terms and their definitions on index cards, and try to memorize five terms at a time. Suggestions were given when reviewing for the test to

underline important words in the definitions to help memorize the terms. Sixth graders also started to write their first synopsis of the novel, My Side of the Mountain on Friday. The structure of a well written book report was reviewed, and an example of a book report and guidelines can be found in their language book (yellow text) on page 398. The next book report will be due on Monday, September 30th. From this point on sixth grade students are asked to refer to the Spelling Demons list on page 464 in the language book for their new spelling words.

# JUNIOR HIGH AND HIGH SCHOOL

It is now Week 5, meaning we are officially halfway through our first quarter of the school year. All students with a current percentage of 75% and lower were given a progress report to take home. If your student does not have one to show you, their grades are above that cutoff point.

Seventh grade students are studying maps and contour lines in Earth Science. They took their third test and participated in Ana activity where they created a topographic map of their own original landform.

Grade eight English students completed their first chapter test. All of the students did well. In Literature they currently reading the novel *A Wrinkle In Time*. In Life Science, they did their first lab named "Does Bacteria Taste Good?", which required them to illustrate the bacteria found in yogurt through the lens of the microscope.

Ninth grade students are learning about some of the first settlements of North America and why they
